It either refers to the fact that it replaced its predecessor, Kufi script, or that this style allows faster copying of texts.

### **How Many Styles Does Arabic Calligraphy Has?**

The Six Styles (Aqlam el-Sitta) of the classical tradition of Islamic calligraphy were created and perfected by Ibn Muqlah and his successors Ibn el-Bawwâb and Yaqût. They are the Naskh (basis for most Arabic fonts), Thuluth, Muhaqqaq, Rayhani, Riq'a' and Tawqi' scripts.

"Riq'a' " is derived from the Arabic noun , ruq'a , meaning "a patch or piece of cloth ." The script was named thus because it was frequently written on little pieces of paper to petition royalty. It was developed from Naskh and Thuluth . Nonetheless Riq'a has a close affinity with Thuluth , Riq'a developed in various direction .

Naskh is one of the six major cursive Arabic scripts. Its origins can be traced back to the late eighth century AD and it is still in use today, over 1300 years later. In its earliest form Naskh was a utilitarian script, mainly used for ordinary correspondence on papyrus, but during the tenth and eleventh centuries it was completely transformed by the elegant refinements of the great Abbasid calligraphers.

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
